This lead to me saying morning prayer while still in bed. I loved to reflect on the readings from Morning Prayer while we walked. So an understanding formed between us that after I prayed, we would walk.

Pause for Silence

From the very beginnings of Christianity there has been silence.

"We live in a world dominated by noise. Religion is for many a haven from the cacophony of everyday life, allowing us to pause for silent contemplation. But there are many forms of religious silence, both positive and negative..." (1)

In this short piece I will share some thoughts about silence in worship and, in particular the liturgy. Some thirty odd years ago Micheal Ramsey, the 100th Archbishop of Canterbury authored a small book, 'study in the life of prayer,' taking as the title verse 11 from psalm 46 " Be Still And Know " - that I am God - speaks to us of being still; being silent in order that we may know God.

Silence, Ramsey says, "enables us to be aware of God, to let mind and imagination dwell upon his truth, to let prayer be listening before it is talking, and to discover our own selves in a way that is not always possible when we are making or listening to noise." (2)

In another place he says, "If every spare moment within and around the liturgy is filled with music and activity much is lost in the linking of liturgy to the meditative and contemplative aspects of the Christian life." (3)

There is, perhaps, in these times of modern technology, to consider something said thirty years ago, as rather outdated. However in a recent book of Rowan Williams, "Being Human" (4) he says, in the chapter 'Silence and human maturity,' "For God to Communicate who and what God is, God needs our silence." and, he goes on to say, "We can apply this to the liturgy of the Church. Good liturgy is about silence;"

Technology has lead to a much wider use of the PowerPoint, iPads, etc. Certainly helpful for those with arthritis, but also they have tended to remove the use of Prayer books and Hymn books (some folks prefer to use books still) Changing what is on the screen eliminates much of the pause between verses and Prayers, and thus any moment of pause for reflection. This would suggest, those who plan Worship need to be more aware of the pauses and silences. The BAS is used extensively in our worship and a review of the introductory notes for the Eucharist and the reciting of the psalms would be helpful to allow for the significant silence and reflection during the liturgy. Originally the psalms were always sung, (in order to appreciate the poetry) and there was always a pause (count 3 to 4) between the two halves. (5 and 6)

There is mystery in our liturgy and we should not try to explain it by more words and noise. We should not seek to control what God might be communicating to the faithful soul sitting in the pew, individually or corporately.
