Several years ago, I knew a person who was struggling emotionally and spiritually. As part of her daily routine, she wrote down one thing that she was thankful for that day. Council of the North

On January 1st, the Bishop became chair of the Council. This group coordinates the ministry in the northern and remote Diocese. It represents nearly one quarter of the national church's budget. This is for a three year term.

Christ's directive to love our enemies? I think the reason is that we want to be part of the solution and not part of the problem. The best example I see to drive this point home is Paul of Tarsus. He was chosen by God and changed – did a complete about face. The Christians were reluctant to accept him. Why should they. They had heard what he was up to. But God had plans they were not aware of. In our own lives we need to accept that we don't see the whole picture. We are the centre of our own little world and that is a limited view. Humility is very basic to doing God's will. It can clear the way for us to love our enemies.

A late addition! Dr. Bonnie Henry announced on January 7th, that the restriction in place will continue with the addition of only household groups being allowed to seated together in restaurants.
