Light in the dark

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. *John 1:5 (ESV)*

I have lived most of my life in northern Canada. The days leading up to Christmas and throughout January seem very dark. There is almost an oppressiveness about it. Especially how it lingers on well past Christmastide. The days do lengthen, that is noticeable. But the darkness clings on.

It is in this darkness that I am reminded of John prologue. That epic cosmic view of Jesus's arrival. It is not the romantic view Luke offers, but one much grander. One that is linked not to merely Bethlehem, but to all of creation. It is a view that offers me much hope in the dark days. For it places Jesus as the permanent light in a dark world.

Darkness takes many forms. We all struggle with it in some form. Be it actual darkness and Seasonal Affected Disorder, or a list of other options. As I look around the Diocese is see people struggling with loss in many forms. Loss through death, a deep and tangible wound. Loss through the CoVid restrictions and fears of contracting the virus. Loss of employment and food security are placing a greater need on food banks and shelters in the Diocese, too. There is no

St James Brings Hope to a Refugee Family

At Christmas time, we celebrate the miraculous birth of Jesus. We gather with friends and family to mark this momentous event. We light candles to signify the hope that Christ brought to the world and we exchange gifts just as the Magi brought gifts to the baby in the manger. But there is another darker aspect to the story of Christ's birth.

Jesus was born into a perilous situation. King Herod had heard of the child and wanted him found and killed. An

One day last month I was at the sink planning to remove the skin from a beet which I had cooked. whiter than when I started. That is what God's love in Jesus is like. It takes our disgusting sins and wipes them off leaving us with a clean slate. angel appears to Joseph and tells him that he and his family must flee the country in order to protect their very special son. And so, shortly after his birth, Jesus and his family fled to



Egypt where they lived as refugees.

Earlier this year, St James Church made the decision to help another refugee family. Aisha Mhmid, her husband, and four children also fled a tyrannical despot who had declared war on his own citizens, Bashar al-Assad of Syria. Fearing for the lives of their children, Aisha and her husband made the heartbreaking decision to leave their country, their friends and their family to find a safer life. For the past seven years, they have lived as refugees in Turkey.

Aisha's two brothers, Ismail and Mahmoud, live in Smithers and they have been trying for years to help their little sister and her young family. In June 2021, St James partnered with Canada Caring Society to submit a refugee sponsorship application to bring Aisha and her family to Smithers. The application is supported by the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster and the funds required to sponsor the family were raised by community members.

It will probably take up to two years before the Mhmid family will arrive in Canada, but as this very difficult year ends and a new year begins, they have hope for the future for the first time in many years. This would not have been

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now on.) We will need to put on the whole armour of God if we are to cooperate with God's healing forgiveness. As we add the armour God will help us gently along the way. Perhaps as the New Year begins you will want to read Ephesians 6:11-17 to refresh your memory on the whole armour of God.
