Glory to Glory by way of ashes

If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

Psalm 95.7-8

Recently I saw a social media post that was critical of the notion that the season of Epiphany winds down. While I doubt social media is the best space for nuanced theological and liturgical conversations, it is an incredible space to highlight the need for further exploration. (It's like the text asking for a meeting.).

Epiphany starts with the revelation of the birth of the Messiah to the Magi. It ends with the Transfiguration of our Lord. Sandwiched between these two remarkable events are repeated reminders of the glory of Christ and his manifestation to the world. As followers of Jesus Christ, we are called to look to his life for inspiration and hope. It is through his death and resurrection that we have eternal life.

So, I would not say that a season of the church calendar winds down. My experience is that Epiphany winds up to the Transfiguration before slapping us with the harsh reality of Ash Wednesday. Seeing the glory of Jesus on Sunday and being told that we are "dust, and to dust shall we return" on

Wednesday places life into context.

We cannot earn our salvation or buy it. It is simply a gift from a loving God. It is how we receive this gift is telling. Living in a culture that places high value on consumerism, modelling values of generosity, patience, and love are important. We find strength to live into these values by reading Scripture, praying, gathering with other believers, and partaking in the Sacraments.

With Lent approaching, what holy habits are you being called to cultivate? I remember as a teenager the pride of not slipping up through Lent and having any junk food. Looking back, I am embarrassed as how I missed the point and made that journey about me and my personal strength. It wasn't about needing to lean into Jesus for strength and encouragement. May God inspire you though these days to draw closer and know that his glory is ours and while we are dust, there is glory beyond the grave.

Let us pray.

O GOD, who on the holy mount didst reveal to chosen witnesses thy well-beloved Son wonderfully transfigured: Mercifully grant-unto us such a vision of his divine majesty, that we, being purified and strengthened by thy grace, may be transformed into his likeness from glory to glory; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP - Collect for the Transfiguration of our Lord)

Almighty and everlasting God, you despise nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent. Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our brokenness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (BAS - Collect for Ash Wednesday)
